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Two Complementary Powers - In the Jewish Tannaitic Period (30 B.C. - 200 A.D.) it defined belief in a second being who was Yahweh's partner, vice-regent or vizier, believed to have divine attributes that were thought to be possessed only by the supreme God, Yahweh.
